Fourth Best.

Joey Silver was on lead against a contract you don't want really like to be on lead against given the sequence and your own hand. Without an attractive alternative he lead 4th best from his longest and strongest. Like grandma. It worked like a charm and declarer made only 7 tricks for almost a top for EW.

Of course anything can work or fail in bridge in general and opening leads in particular. But I think small heart is the correct lead. Declarer has four hearts so there is no point in leading a honor. And you have a couple of entries so there is no point in not leading your good five card suit. But very few players got this one right. On a small heart lead normal play (diamond finesse at trick 2) will result in 7 or 8 tricks. But all declarers but one in 3NT made their contract and playing in a partial you needed +180 for an average score. What did I lead myself? I didn't lead, I stole the contract in 2♥ undoubled for -100. Almost as good as Joey's -90.

A top for Nuno Matos.

At most tables tables the contract was 4♠ by East. Nuno was North. His partner (the infamous Carlos) lead a heart for the ♥K and ♥A. Nuno exited with a spade. Declarer drew trumps and had to tackle diamonds himself. He started by small to the ♦Q, not the best line on these breaks. Nuno made the best of his opportunities by taking the ♦Q with ♦K and returning a small one which declarer misguessed for one down. This seemed a good but not spectacular result. 4♠ is a difficult contract which easily goes down on passive defense. But 4♠ was made 27 times and went down only twice. So Nuno got almost a clean top for doing essentially nothing. Sometimes you have to defend passively. Sometimes you have to defend actively. But that is what the next article is about.

Cashing your tricks.

Yesterday's theme was cashing your tricks. On two boards you could earn a near-top by just taking your tricks. That can be quite difficult.

Board 11. At almost all tables the contract was 4♥ by North. 27 times out of 36 twelve tricks were made. Why? Maybe because North showed a strong hand and South didn't show spades in which case I can imagine East trying a 'safe' major lead. Maybe because you have a problem on the ♦A lead. Normally this is from AK so East encourages holding the ♦Q and then it is very difficult to switch clubs. Or maybe because after a club lead you tried to cash a second club. The only real solution in clubs is 'Polish leads' or 2nd-4th. Then you can see the difference between K-3rd and K-4th which you cannot see playing 3rd-5th or classical 4th best (although you probably should switch to diamonds anyway). Club lead and diamond switch is the optimal defense for 3 tricks. The only real solution in diamonds is Rusinow (meaning leading K from AK and Q from KQ). If the Ace denies the King then this one is easy. 2 tricks is not as good as 3 but still a 85% score.

Board 17. The normal contract is 4♠ bij South. The normal lead is the ♣K. Only one out of five defenders managed to get the ♦A. Why? In this kind of situation a lot depends on the bidding, or in other words what do you know. But with this kind of dummy you should always assume that declarer can run the hearts. If not there is no problem. An approach is for East to give count on ♣K. Declarer won't duck the ♣A with ♣J in dummy so there is no real point in encouraging - discouraging. But most play attitude anyway in this situation and then you should discourage to let partner switch to diamonds (you might even overtake). Without anything in diamonds he will return ♦7 so declarer is marked with ♦K and you can try a second club. With ♦K partner will play a small one. In that case it might still be very difficult to 'guess' the 3rd trick but here the first two tricks were already enough for a near top.

Dutch training.

Like 'normal' bridge players we were discussing the boards at dinner. Focusing mainly on the two boards where you had to cash your tricks. What went wrong and what to do about it. Then the discussion drifted to a Dutch training session. It is about cashing your tricks. You hold: ♠KQJ9 ♥653 ♦732 ♣854. Opponents bid 1NT-3NT and you lead the ♠K. So far so good. Dummy comes down with 13 points or so and two small spades. ♠K holds the trick. The only hope to defeat this contract is to find partner with ♠A-5th. What do you play next.

The answer is ♠J (and ♠9 the third trick). If you lazily play ♠Q partner cannot see the difference between ♠KQ-3rd (declaring holding three cards) and ♠KQ-4th (declaring holding two cards) and he will go wrong because from KQ-3rd you have to play the ♠Q. Of course declarer had the ♠10. The idea is NOT to play the known card so partner can be sure you have still have one left to play.

Lesson one. Be very careful in cash-out situations.

Lesson two. As declarer try to scramble their signals.

Lesson three. As declarer always keep hope. Actually it was a kind of joke. At one table the declarer claimed one down as soon as she saw dummy because she thought the objective of the hand was to reach 5♦ which was cold. So we end with an extension of lesson three. Never claim as long as you are not down yet.
